### Scholarship & Discount Definitions

Scholarship Name	Description
<b>BGU Student Aid</b>	Scholarships from generous donors to help cover student's tuition costs who are on campus.
<b>Pell Grant</b>	A federal grant awarded based upon student's financial need.
<b>PT Tuition Scholarship or Federal Work College Award</b>	Aid received for working a practical training position on campus. Students earn around \$14.51 an hour which is applied to their tuition. This award is entirely institutionally funded. The Federal Work College Award is a combination of institutional funds and federal financial aid funds and is given to eligible students.
<b>FSEOG</b>	A Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG) is a grant for undergraduate students with exceptional financial need.
<b>Global Internship Tuition Scholarship</b>	Funding from donors that covers the cost of tuition while students are on Global Internship
<b>Campus Visit Event Scholarship</b>	Freshmen who attend a semi-annual Campus Preview Weekend will get a \$300 scholarship.
<b>Individual Campus Visit Scholarship</b>	Freshmen who attend an individual campus visit will get a \$200 scholarship.
<b>Pay in Advance Discount</b>	Pay for the entire year in full by the first payment deadline and get a \$300 discount. Loans do not qualify as payment. Off-campus students are ineligible. Sophomores in the AA program and spring seniors who are on campus for one semester in the year receive a \$150 discount.

### Loan Information

<b>Federal Direct Student Loans</b>	<p>There are two types of federal direct loans: subsidized and unsubsidized. Subsidized Loans are Loans that The U.S. Department of Education pays interest on while you're in school at least half-time, for the first six months after you leave school (referred to as a grace period*), and during a period of deferment (a postponement of loan payments). Unsubsidized Loans are loans that the borrower is responsible for paying the interest on during all periods. If you choose not to pay the interest your interest will accrue (accumulate) and be capitalized (that is, your interest will be added to the principal amount of your loan).</p>

	<b>Graduate or Professional Student Annual Loan Limit</b>	Not Applicable (all graduate and professional degree students are considered independent).	Not Applicable (all graduate and professional degree students are considered independent).
<b>Subsidized and Unsubsidized Aggregate Loan Limit</b>	\$31,000-No more than \$23,000 of this amount may be in subsidized loans.	\$31,000-No more than \$23,000 of this amount may be in subsidized loans.	
<b>PLUS Loans</b>	<p>This is a federal loan that parents can receive for up to the amount of the total cost of attendance minus any other aid received. If the parent has an adverse credit history or there are extenuating circumstances, such as a recent bankruptcy, then the student may receive the independent loan amount listed above. The parent must complete the application and Master Promissory Note (MPN) at <a href="http://StudentLoans.gov">StudentLoans.gov</a>.</p>

## Glossary of Financial Aid Terms

**Cost of Attendance (COA):** The total amount (not including grants and scholarships) that it will cost you to go to school during the 2022-2023 school year. Includes:

- **Direct Costs:** Costs are charged by the school such as tuition, fees, housing, and meals.
- **Indirect Costs:** Expenses that may arise due to being in school, such as books, supplies, transportation, loan fees, miscellaneous and personal expenses, and reasonable costs for eligible study-abroad programs.
- **For students attending less than half-time:** The COA includes tuition and fees; an allowance for books, supplies, and transportation.

**Direct Subsidized Loan:** Loans that The U.S. Department of Education pays the interest on while you're in school at least half-time, for the first six months after you leave school (referred to as a grace period\*), and during a period of deferment (a postponement of loan payments).

**Direct Unsubsidized Loan:** Loans that the borrower is responsible for paying the interest on during all periods. If you choose not to pay the interest while you are in school and during grace periods and deferment or forbearance periods, your interest will accrue (accumulate) and be capitalized (that is, your interest will be added to the principal amount of your loan).

**Expected Family Contribution (EFC):** A number used by your school to calculate the amount of federal student aid you are eligible to receive. It is based on the financial information provided in your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). This is not the amount of money your family will have to pay for college, nor is it the amount of federal student aid you will receive.

**Federal Work College:** At Work Colleges all resident students are required to work regardless of their financial circumstances. Students are evaluated, receive constructive advice, and help with work and career preparation. Importantly, Work College students contribute directly to the daily operation of their campus. At Work Colleges student earnings are considered scholarships and are applied directly to the cost of tuition.

**Grants and Scholarships:** Student aid funds that do not have to be repaid. Grants are often need-based, while scholarships are usually merit-based. Occasionally, you might have to pay back part or all of a grant if, for example, you withdraw from school before finishing a semester. If you use a grant or scholarship to cover your living expenses, the amount of your scholarship may be counted as taxable income on your tax return.

**Loans:** Borrowed money that must be repaid with interest. Loans from the federal government typically have a lower interest rate than loans from private lenders. Federal loans are called Direct Subsidized Loans, Direct Unsubsidized Loans, and Parent PLUS Loans. You can find more information about federal loans at [StudentAid.gov](http://StudentAid.gov).

**Net Price:** An estimate of the actual cost that a student and his or her family need to pay in a given year to cover educational expenses for the student to attend a particular school. Net price is determined by taking the institution's cost of attendance and subtracting any grants and scholarships for which the student may be eligible.

**Origination Fees:** An upfront fee charged by a lender for processing a new loan application. It is compensation for putting the loan in place. Origination fees are quoted as a percentage of the total loan.

**Parent Plus Loan:** A loan available to the parents of dependent undergraduate students for which the borrower is fully responsible for paying the interest.

**Private or Institutional Loan:** A non-federal loan made by a lender such as a bank, credit union, state agency, or school.
